If you have not participated in the fundraiser before, make 2023 the year you do! Call your friends and tell them how much fun they could have, driving through the Bluegrass, visiting wineries, and sampling Kentucky wines this spring. We have 13 wineries participating this year and each one will be a unique experience. If you are really in the mood to party, get a group large enough to hire a party bus or fill a car and have a designated driver friend!

All tickets sold will be through Eventbrite. (Our volunteers are not handling charge cards or cash transactions.) You will show your proof of ticket purchase at the first winery you choose to visit. You will then be given our commemorative wine glass, before participating in the tasting. At the next winery you will just need to show the volunteer your new glass.



The cost is \$22 and goes towards the many free programs we have at McConnell Springs Park.

Notes from the Naturalist...

Water, water everywhere, but not a drop that you should drink! Most people would correctly guess that McConnell Springs is known for the

water that flows up out of the ground helping give the park its name. If you've visited the park after heavy rain then it is easy to see the impact of the water draining through the karst spring system. Some days you can hear the Boils before you see the water because it is flowing with such extreme pressure after a significant downpour. Spring showers mean more rain flowing into the park from all directions which creates unique issues for park staff. The park is a low point from all directions and naturally, the site where gravity will pull water. When planning for trails or any other installation at the park we have always had to consider how water would impact

that project. Rain gardens have been installed near the front of the Kentucky American Water Education Center to control runoff from surrounding areas. These gardens catch water and slow it down before it exits the park and, hopefully, helping to clean it as well. New installations in the rain garden that were constructed by Geomancer Permaculture in 2022, help to catch more runoff and slow the flow of rainwater. Geomancer's owner and operator, Leandro Braga, designed the pools to catch sediment and to slowly filter water flow. The pools also create habitat space for animals and native plants. The park also focused heavily on new drainage installations along the entirety of the trail system to lessen the impact of water flow on the ground. The work will be ongoing to keep water moving across the trails towards the springs, but it is an effort that the staff enjoys and values.




