Board Member Spotlight...Isabel Yates

For a person who is so highly winsome in every conceivable way, it is not a surprise that Mrs. Isabel Yates began life in a small town named Winnsboro, SC.

She was born there on October 1, 1924 to a prominent small town physician, Dr. Charles Spencer McCants and Isabel McCants. She was one of four daughters. Growing up in Winnsboro, she learned the value of community life and education by the example of her parents, who were very engaged in the life of the town. Isabel graduated from the University of South Carolina and obtained a Masters degree in English Literature from Ohio State University, where she attended on an academic scholarship. Following her education, she taught English at both high school and university levels, until she married Wilson Yates, an attorney with Kentucky Central Life Insurance Co. in Louisville, KY. They started a family and had four children, who still cause Isabel's eyes to light up with joy and pride when she mentions them.

In 1963, the Yates family moved to Lexington, KY with a company move, and Isabel has been making her mark here ever since. Embracing the city fully, she dove into many civic groups and projects, a sample listing of which includes: downtown hanging baskets, HorseMania, Picnic with the Pops / Philharmonic, Kentucky Theater Restoration, LexArts, Sanders-Brown Center on Aging, Downtown Lexington Corporation and of course, McConnell Springs.

That involvement took a new turn when Isabel ran for Lexington-Fayette UCG Council in 1991 at age 66. She served the 4th district initially and then was vice mayor from 1998-2002. In addition, several community awards have been named after her as tribute to her lifestyle of service to others.

It was my distinct pleasure to work alongside Mrs. Yates, as I called her, during my own career with LFUCG. We shared southern roots and perspectives and I always particularly enjoyed her pronouncement that something was 'wonderful" or "marvelous" in that delightful and distinguished southern drawl. Recently we visited and recounted some

of our adventures at city hall, including the acquisition and preservation of McConnell Springs. That effort involved several important community members, and while it might have happened without Mrs. Yates' leadership. I'm not sure I see how. She was uniquely gifted for that task and wielded a magnificent and indomitable persuasion that just made everyone want to say 'yes'. Isabel might be small in stature, but she is a giant force for good, and her fingerprints are on so many of the most positive things about our community.



She told me her approach to public service was wrapped up in a simple question: "What can we do to improve _____?" Whatever issue filled in that blank, the idea of improving things was her primary focus as she respectfully engaged people from every quarter of the community with consistency and goodwill. I witnessed this more times than I can tell

Dr. McCants, who shared his daughter's penchant for public service, gave Isabel this sage advice: "You better be proud of the place where you live, and you should live so the place is proud of you." May I just say on behalf of everyone that knows you, Mrs. Yates, this place is so incredibly proud of you and grateful for everything you have done. You continue to meet your father's charge in every way and we are the better for it — may we carry the torch as well as you.

Thanks for carrying the torch for McConnell Springs, helping reclaim the spot of our city's founding, and preserving it for generations. Just one part of the wonderful legacy of the winsome lady from Winnsboro.

rently is a Special Projects Deputy in the Land Records Department, and he is the Supervisor and Co-Director of the Digital Access Project (DAP).


