Notes from the Naturalist...

Turkey time! With fall in full swing and the holiday season upon us, many folks will gather around a table with the classic center piece of the season,

the turkey. Central Kentucky is home to a very strong wild turkey population, and you don't have to travel too far out of the urban core of Lexington to find them on farms and in forest remnants. Turkey aren't spotted often at McConnell Springs but it does happen from time to time. Park staff and some lucky students from Stonewall Elementary were able to spot a turkey hen near the Final

Sink in November 2023. Prior to this encounter, only two other confirmed sightings by staff had occurred at McConnell Springs and some of us have worked here for over a decade. Despite being a great potential habitat for the birds they can't access this location easily and are probably scared off by the regular park visitors. If you're quiet and extremely lucky, then perhaps you'll get to have this rare experience on your next walk at the Springs. Even if you don't spot a turkey, the squirrels are always happy to see you!

Jack-O-Lantern Trail a Success!

The Jack-O-Lantern Trail, JOLT, event at McConnell Springs this past October was a huge success! Once again, over 700 pumpkins were carved and donated by the public then placed around our trail for all to enjoy. The weather was cooperative this year and the event was able to operate all four nights. Nearly 11,000 people attended and many more enjoyed the pumpkins walking along the trails during the day.

A question that the staff gets often during the event is "What happens to the pumpkins after the event?". The answer is that several things happen. After JOLT ends, the staff removes all the battery powered lights. All those lights (over 1,500) are collected into buckets and put away until we have volunteers that can assist in removing the batteries. Unfortunately, because of rainfall and pumpkin guts the lights can't be reused so, all the lights and batteries are then taken to LFUCG electronics recycling for responsible disposal. That still leaves over 700 pumpkins sitting around starting to get moldy and mushy. Each year, a local pig farmer comes out and loads up as many pumpkins as their truck and trailer can hold, over 100 this year. After the piggies get their fill, staff and volunteers begin moving the pumpkins into a few different locations. If the pumpkins have been painted or have accessories that aren't biodegradable then they get taken to our dumpster, this is usually a very small number. We focus on filling up our compost bins with as many pumpkins as possible. Lastly, the remaining pumpkins are moved off the trail into the woods where they can degrade naturally.

The plan for 2024 is to have an event immediately following JOLT called Smashin' Pumpkins, where visitors can use different items to smash pumpkins in the woods. We would like to thank park volunteers like Steve Beckelhimer and students from Providence Montessori that helped place pumpkins, lights, and with the removal process.

The Friends of McConnell Springs also donated funds for pumpkins that were carved for the event. Without the efforts of volunteers, the event would not take place.



Board Member Spotlight – Jim Rebmann


McConnell Springs Park is located at 416 Rebmann Lane. If that name sounds familiar, it is because Jim Rebmann is a thread that runs through the tapestry of this park from beginning to end, and it was very fitting to name the street the park is located on in his honor. Jim is our vice chair emeritus, official photographer, site expert, historian, environmental conscience, and says the part he played in making McConnell Springs Park a reality is one of his proudest personal accomplishments.

Jim was born in Brooklyn, NY and raised in Hempstead, on Long Island. Growing up in the northeast, family vacations often revolved around visiting historical sites, particularly those associated with the Revolutionary and French & Indian Wars. At a young age, his interest in early American history and military artifacts surfaced and began a lifelong passion for preserving and protecting things from our nation's early days. Stamps, coins, firearms, bayonets – Jim is an ardent collector and an expert on many things from this period of American history.

A curiosity about different earth strata he saw in the mountains led him toward an interest in geology. Jim came to Eastern Kentucky University in 1965 to study the field and earned his MS in Physical Geography with an emphasis on geology. During his first semester there, one of his professors got him interested in exploring underground caverns. "Spelunking" became a lifelong hobby for Jim, who says he has probably spent more than 5,000 hours underground, much of that in Rockcastle County, KY. He and a companion wrote The Caves of Rockcastle County out of those experiences, still a favorite book in the UK Geology Department library. From there he went to work for KY Geological Survey and then served as an officer in the US Navy.

Fresh out of the Navy, Jim accepted a job in 1974 at the newly formed Lexington Fayette Urban County Government as a Sr. Environmental Planner, a post he held for 41 years. With the karst topography of our region and the associated sinkholes, well-planned development that would account for and avoid these natural structures was very important, and Jim played a major role in developing the needed regulations and protocols to guide new development in the community. He also led the community in protecting the urban forest and gaining the Tree City USA distinction. Many other important environmental initiatives done in this region during the past 30-40 years also bear his fingerprints.

Jim says that first caving adventure in his first semester of school shaped his academic studies to have a life of work-

ing with caves and karst topography, and that he never found a hole in the ground he didn't like! Which brings us to McConnell Springs.

His first trip to the site was in 1974 and by 1976 the site had been designated on the National Register of Historic Places. An open house was organized for New Years Day 1976 where 100 people showed up, despite the 16 degree temperature. Slowly community awareness and interest grew. The site was 26 acres, 23 of which were unusable for development, and had been used as an illegal dumping ground. The bank took possession of the property in 1994 and offered the three acres for sale for \$130,000 and would give the additional 23 acres at no cost. Community leaders Isabel Yates, Weezie Douglas, and Jessica Bell began a public appeal and Jim provided his expertise in understanding how the springs could be returned to their natural state, and the site reclaimed as a park to mark the founding site of Lexington. Early donors began to provide funding toward purchasing the land. Mayor Pam Miller saw the value of the park and agreed to move forward.

With Vice Mayor Isabel Yates' help a non-profit group was formed – The Friends of McConnell Springs – to front the fundraising and park planning efforts. Jim was there every step of the way, and the rest is history.

When asked about who had a particularly important influence on him, Jim pointed to Mayor Foster Petit, who was mayor when Jim began working for the city. Mayor Petit took Jim to breakfast one day early in his career, and advised him to do his work with these two things in mind: Be kind to other people, and think of your work in terms of how many people you can help. Jim also provided this advice gained from his own experience: Trying to do something by yourself doesn't work as well as partnering with other people.

Every person who walks these trails owes you a debt of gratitude, and you have ours as well.

The Friends of McConnell Springs board has honored Isabel Yates, James Rebmann, and John Keifer, our emeritus board members, for their continued support of the park. A legacy donation was made in their honor at the Blue Grass Community Foundation (BGCF) to The Friends of McConnell Springs endowed fund.

The BGCF manages the endowed fund and provides the board with the ability to write grants each year to support the park. The board can elect to write grants annually or retain the granted amount in the fund for a future need.

The board has embraced the future to support the park in this lasting way, much like our emeritus board members have continued their support of McConnell Springs Park their lifetimes.

The Roots for Remembrance program at McConnell Springs is a great way to remember a loved one or to honor someone special to you.
